Board of Education moves forward with Capital Referendum

Accepts Donations, Approves Administrator Retirement

At the Board of Education meeting held Monday, December 16, 2024, the Board voted unanimously to advance two questions to the voters at the April 1, 2025 election.

QUESTION #1

The first question that will be posed to voters in April is a request for funds to attend to projects of significant need, including safe and secure entrances, as well as degrading and insufficient infrastructure. Citing the findings of the recent Safety Walk conducted by the Outagamie County Sheriff's Department, in conjunction with the tragedy that unfolded the same day at a school in Madison, Mrs. Schweitzer, District Administrator, emphasized the need for safe and secure entrances to be built for each school. "We need to have a safe and secure entrance for each school that includes office staff members having direct oversight of controlled entrances, where visitors must verify their business and be buzzed through a second set of locked doors. Right now, visitors can gain access to the schools, sometimes both the first and second floors, before anyone from the office could stop them." Voters will be asked to approve the construction of new offices and entrances at both schools that will include direct oversight of double-

doored controlled entrances by office staff. The elementary office would be built onto the current kindergarten wing while the middle and high school office would be built as a combination of remodeling the current choir room and building outward into the parking lot.

"The needs of the District's infrastructure have not improved since we went to the voters in February. If anything, the condition of the components has deteriorated further," noted Schweitzer. The voters will be asked to approve funds to update and replace infrastructure needs such as the 1960's plumbing, primarily in the elementary wing, as well as the electrical panels, which are at maximum capacity and do not allow for further expansion of operational nor educational equipment such as planers, CAD, and cutters.

Funds will also be requested for building a more industry-standard Technical Education learning environment, which will include the remodeling of the current Technical Education areas. Much of the current Technical Education space dates back to the 1950's and is no longer able to sustain an education that prepares students for their future in the trades today nor for tomorrow. As part of Question #1, voters will be asked for funding that

The first half of the school year has gone by quickly, and we are already looking ahead to the end of our first semester. Our staff is proud of the work that we have put in so far, and we will continue to work hard to help our students succeed. We look forward to what the Spring semester brings.

There are a few things that I want to make sure parents/guardians are aware of as we start the new year. First, we have begun the scheduling process for the 2025-2026 school year for next year's high school students. Our school counselor, Mrs. Cornell, has either met with or plans to meet with all 8th grade and 11th grade students to discuss what their class selections will look like based on their anticipated career paths and interests. We have also worked in home-rooms and small groups with our 9th and 10th grade students on their course selections paths. Students will register for their courses during the month of January. their course selections as well.

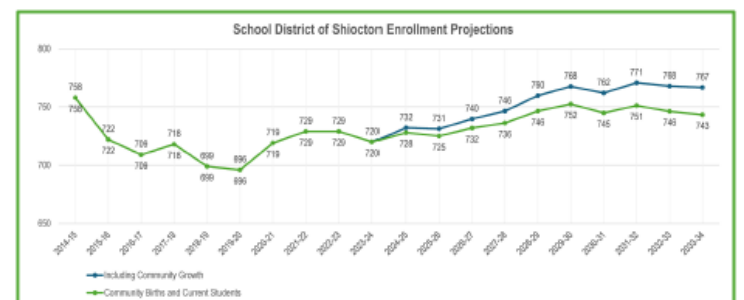

This will help them prepare for the ACT and Pre-ACT testing later on in Spring. The last day of Semester I is January 21. On January 22, there is no school for students. In February of this year, an anonymous letter was sent to all Shiocton residents via the United States Postal Service containing a personalized viewpoint of several referendum topics. The author included data that was incomplete and misleading. As the School District of Shiocton continues to explore options to improve the school district programs, instruction, and facilities, it is important to provide our community with accurate information to encourage productive conversations concerning our future.

MYTH The school's enrollment has not grown over the last (10) years.

FACT In the capital referendum planning process, it is more important to be looking ahead than at the past. While it is true that Shiocton experienced a decline in enrollment up to 2019, since then, enrollments have begun to climb. It is through the offering of quality programs, instruction, and facilities that Shiocton will continue to grow as a district of choice for families and students in the years to come.



MYTH Enrollment is the only thing that impacts the size and growth of a school.

FACT Growth is not just quantitative but also qualitative. In just the past four years, the District has:

- strengthened its academic programming through curricular adoptions from Physical Education to Mathematics and, most recently, English Language Arts
- aligned our current curriculum and instruction to new State Standards in Science (NGSS), History & Social Science, and, most recently, Personal Financial Management
- added additional programming through increased courses in the trade areas
- added offerings through our extra-curricular programming, including Trap Shooting, MS baseball & softball, and, most recently, Dance
- increased staffing to meet the ever changing needs of children, from interventions to enhancements, from universal instruction to instructional enrichment
- strengthened our educators through professional development in curriculum and instruction or specific supports offered through programs such as Conscious Discipline, Restorative Practices, and, Science of Reading

covers the costs associated with the updated infrastructure and the remodel and building of a Technical Education wing.

“Equity in access to education is of concern to us. We need to ensure that our students today, tomorrow, and into the future have equitable access to education and the educational environments,” commented Mrs. Schweitzer. As such, another component of the projects covered under Question #1 includes the remodeling of the band room to provide equity in locker room space and features for both the boys and the girls. As a result, rooms would be built onto the current lower-level high school wing so the choir and band rooms would be in close proximity to each other and to the shared practice and storage rooms.

The total funds requested in Question #1, including acquisition of furnishings, fixtures, and equipment related to the specific projects, will not exceed \$23,500,000.00.

QUESTION #2

The second question that will be posed to voters in April is a request for funds to attend to a specific project of need, that of a new varsity gym complete with enlarged concession, lobby, and restroom spaces.

As discussed during the previous capital referendum meetings, the current gym space is not sufficient to meet the growing demand for its use. From physical education classes and lunchtime recess to athletic team practices and games, as well as fine arts events and performances, the current high school gym space is spoken for most every weekday from 6:00AM to 6:00PM. This leaves little time for community access to the facilities be that for youth athletic practices and games, such as Hoops Club or Wrestling Club, or for community club use such as Archery Club or Hunter Safety instruction. Additionally, the bleachers within the current high school gym are not friendly towards those with limited ambulation and often serve

as a deterrent to those folks’ attendance at events.

“The new gym also addresses our concerns related to equity in access to education and educational environments,” commented Schweitzer. “The new gym would provide the student-athletes and the teachers and coaches with learning spaces that are equitable and accessible for the instruction of academic mastery standards, as well as affording growth for our athletic and fine arts programs. Too, the new gym would increase the access for community members be that for attendance at events, as well as access to space for practices, games, and events.” Schweitzer noted that the increased, more accessible space will further serve to draw people into our community for events, which also means more money being spent at our local stores and diners, as well as the expanded concession stand that serves as a fundraiser for many school clubs and organizations. “The new gym squarely addresses the lack of equity in accessing education and educational environments. It is a win-win for all ages.”

APRIL VOTE

In keeping with the feedback that was provided after the February 2024 failed capital referendum, the Board of Education adopted a resolution providing for the referendum election to take place during the regularly scheduled Wisconsin Spring Election on April 1, 2025.

DONATIONS ACCEPTED

In other business, the Board of Education has accepted many, many generous donations from the local and extended community, be those individuals, families, or companies, over the past few months.

In November, the Board accepted donations of metals, woods, and materials to the Technical Education department with a total valuation of over \$10,000.00. Monetary donations of nearly \$3,000.00 were accepted for the Food and Toy Drive, an annual giving event led by the High School Student Council. Additional monetary donations, also in the thousands of dollars, were received for school programs including the Drama Club, Band, IT Department, and Athletic Department.

Community members have rallied around two large projects this fall: the Playground Fund and the Bleacher Fund. The Board accepted donations of money and equipment totaling over \$30,000.00 for the Playground Fund. Originally started through donations from a groundswell of interested individuals, the Playground Fund has received generous donations from community members near and far, as well as funds raised through raffles, basket sales, and the like. The Board also accepted a donation in the amount of \$50,000.00 this fall from Mr. and Mrs. Vorland for the Bleacher Fund. When added to the \$80,000.00 donated by the Gridiron Club last spring, sufficient funds were provided so that new bleachers could be ordered; installation is expected to be complete by the first football game of the 2025-2026 school year.

“Again, this year, we have been blessed by the overwhelming generosity and support of our community members, families, and businesses. We appreciate the efforts of all who have spearheaded fundraisers, sought out grant opportunities, and generally shared the needs of the District by word of mouth and

through social media. Words cannot fully express the District’s deep appreciation for the many, many donations we have received so far this school year,” Mrs. Schweitzer stated.

ADMINISTRATOR RESIGNATION APPROVED

At their meeting on December 2, 2024, the Board of Education accepted the request to retire from Mrs. Schweitzer, District Administrator. In her letter to the Board, Mrs. Schweitzer noted that the superintendency is not a job, position, or profession, but rather a lifestyle, a lifestyle she has been honored to live. Mrs. Schweitzer noted her twelve years in the District “have been some of the most rewarding of my professional career” and thanked the Board for their unwavering support and commitment to the students and staff of the District. When asked of her plans after retirement, Mrs. Schweitzer confirmed that she is not leaving Shiocton for another superintendent position but rather she is looking forward to spending more time with her husband and two children.

Mrs. Schweitzer’s retirement is effective June 30, 2025. The Board of Education is finalizing the process for selecting a new District Administrator, including hosting a Town Hall meeting on Monday, January 20, 2025 beginning at 6:00PM in the school cafeteria. Community members are encouraged to attend this meeting to give feedback on what is important for the Board to look for in the next superintendent.



January’s Board of Education meetings will be held on the 13th and 27th beginning at 6:00PM. Community members are always welcome to attend the Board of Education open meetings.

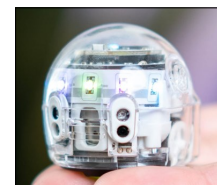
Fourth Graders improving on their research skills

The Shiocton Child Care Center (SCCC) is now under new management, and we will be **LIFTING THE ENROLLMENT FREEZE.**

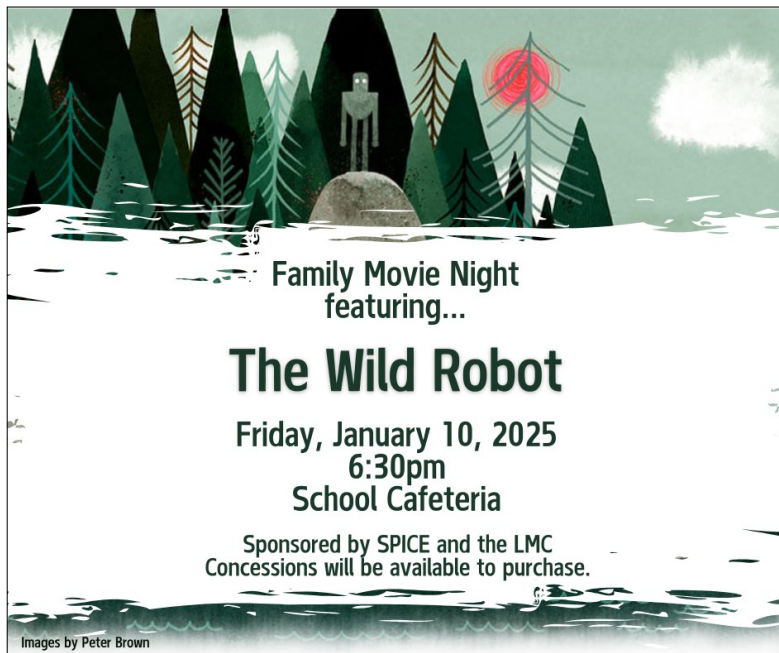

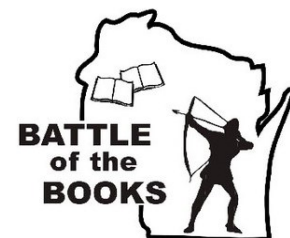
